The Indo-British Scholars' Association or IBSA is a non-profit registered society with 80G certification, set up under the auspices of the British Council. IBSA was founded in 1997, during the visit of then Prime Minister Sir John Major to Kolkata on the sidelines of the CII Partnership Summit. IBSA seeks to deepen relations between India and the UK through a range of activities, in the fields of Education, Art and Culture, Science and Technology, Business and Entrepreneurship.

IBSA also supports several social causes including extending scholarships for spoken English classes for deserving students through British Council. It supports some NGOs working in the area of education, skills development and counseling for women and girls. IBSA has extended support for children who are cancer survivors through Tata Memorial Cancer Centre. IBSA provided sports scholarships and cricket kits for differently abled youth and for girls under 19 years selected by Jhulan Goswami and CAB.

IBSA members are typically either alumni of UK universities, or have worked, trained or undertaken research at institutions in the UK. In addition, IBSA invites a select number of organisations, with strong connections to the UK, to join as Corporate Patrons. At present, members of IBSA number over 390 and include many prominent citizens of India and beyond. Corporate Patrons number 35 and comprise of organisations of national and global repute.

- In-depth discussions on critical thematic areas such as renewable energy and low-carbon infrastructure financing, adaptation and resilience project funding. Also ESG-linked finance instruments and technology enablers like AI, blockchain and fintech for sustainability
- A highly engaging Oxford-style debate

Among the distinguished speakers were Ms. Arundhati Bhattacharya, President & CEO at Salesforce South Asia and Former Chairperson, State Bank of India and Mr. Chandra Sekhar Ghosh, Chairman Bandhan Group, Former MD & CEO of Bandhan Bank, who in their keynote address, shared insights on long term impact that climate and sustainable finance can bring about both in social sphere and business.

A recipient of ARCA from the Royal College of Art, London Sheikh's printmaking journey took us from traditional formats to more innovative contemporary digital outputs and his Accordion Books. Greatly influenced by Ebstorf maps while in the UK, the artist displayed his Mappa Mundi series where he uses maps as metaphors, questioning colonial borders, memory and geo-political themes.

TAGORE AND UK ECHOES OF HARMONY - T2 (THE TELEGRAPH)

ECHOES OF HARMONY CELEBRATED TAGORE'S LASTING CONNECTIONS WITH BRITAIN

Echoes of Harmony — Rabindranath Tagore & the United Kingdom, held on May 15 by the British Council in collaboration with the Indo-British Scholars' Association (IBSA), belonged unmistakably to a rare kind of evening that lingers softly in memory, in music, in the strange intimacy created when poetry finds its way into a room full of strangers.

Conceived and curated by Korak Basu, the programme unfolded with the unhurried grace of a literary memoir. Through recitation, song, theatre, and narration, it revisited the long and layered relationship between Rabindranath Tagore and Britain, a relationship shaped by intellectual companionship, artistic discovery, and an enduring conversation between cultures.

The evening began in near meditative stillness with a Vedic chant by Ritadolon Bandopadhyay, followed by a recitation by Swati Gautam of IBSA. The atmosphere carried a certain old-world gentleness, preparing the audience for a journey into Tagore's encounters with England — first as a young man arriving there in 1878, curious and impressionable, absorbing unfamiliar landscapes, literature, and musical traditions



Alongside Korak Basu, artists Pradip Dutta, Ipsita Ganguli and Ritadolon Bandopadhyay carried the narrative with emotional precision, while Subrata Mukherjee on keyboards and Anjan Bandopadhyay on rhythms lent the evening its quiet musical pulse.

that would quietly widen the horizons of his imagination.

Rather than presenting history as chronology, the production allowed moments to surface like recollections. Tagore's return to England in 1912, carrying with him the translated verses of *Gitanjali* — *Song Offerings*, emerged as one of the emotional centres of the evening. The narrative dwelt delicately on the friendships and artistic affinities that followed, with figures such as WB Yeats and William Rothenstein, who recognised in Tagore's writing a luminous spiritual depth unfamiliar to Western literary circles of the time. The Nobel Prize that arrived in 1913 felt within the texture of the performance like the

natural flowering of a voice that had travelled beyond borders.

Music moved through the evening like an undercurrent. Renderings of *Amare tumi ashesh korecho*, *Pran bhorte trisha horte*,

Tagore's friendship with British artist William Rothenstein, modernist poet WB Yeats and Scottish polymath Patrick Geddes was marked by deep mutual respect and inspiration of each other's artistic practices and philosophies," said Debanjan Chakrabarti, director, British Council, East and Northeast India.

composed during Tagore's sea voyage to England, and *Kobbaro bhebechhina*, touched by the cadence of English lyrical forms, revealed how profoundly travel and encounter had entered his artistic consciousness. The transitions between song and spoken word were seamless, almost fluid, allowing the audience to drift between languages, moods, and eras without rupture.

As the evening progressed, attention turned to Tagore's continuing relationship with Britain through lectures, publications, and exchanges with artists and intellectuals. His Hibbert Lectures at Oxford, the honorary D.Litt. bestowed upon him, and his conversations with thinkers across disciplines suggested a relationship rooted in reciprocity.

The final moments arrived almost imperceptible with *Parano shet dher kotha*, Tagore's Bengali adaptation of *Auld Lang Syne*. As members of the audience began singing along, the performance dissolved into something deeply communal. For a brief moment, the hall seemed suspended between Bengal and Scotland, memory and melody, past and present. It was perhaps the most fitting conclusion imaginable, a reminder that Tagore's legacy survives not in reverence alone, but in participation, in shared feeling, in the human instinct to gather around song and story.

MEDICAL COLLEGE KOLKATA HERITAGE WALK – TIMES OF INDIA

A walk through the 192-year-old heritage of the country's first medical college

Kolkata: An immersive walk through the historic buildings and grounds of Calcutta Medical College, the first institution in Asia to impart systematic education in Western medicine, traced the evolution of medicine, education and society, while situating history within the living and breathing campus of today.

The heritage walk was organised on the occasion of the 192nd foundation day by Medical College Ex-students' Association (MCESA). "This walk honours the layered legacy of



the institution — medical, architectural, intellectual, and human," said MCESA vice-president Abhik Ghosh. Another member, Anirban Dalui, felt there was a need to make medical history accessible to non-specialist audiences through storytelling.

Medical College was established on Jan 28, 1835, when colonial Calcutta faced repeated public-health emergencies — malaria, cholera, kala-az

— making modern, evidence-based healthcare an urgent civic need. Mountford Joseph Bramley was appointed the first principal of Medical College of Bengal in 1835, and Henry Goodeve was the first professor of medicine, although there was no separate department of medicine then.

Around 150 participants who met in front of the administrative block — a Victorian structure erected in 1911 — were guided through a curated selection of distinguished institutional spaces.

Alumnus of Medical College and convenor of the event, Amit Ghose, who conducted the walk, said, "It was at the anatomy building that Madhusudan Gupta per-

formed the first human cadaver dissection by an Indian in 1836, under Goodeve's guidance, challenging deep-seated taboos. The building still houses the dissection hall and has a museum, which has 150 anatomical specimens preserved."

The next stop was Swarnamoyee Hostel and Bidumukhi Hostel. "Maharani Swarnamoyee of Cossimbazar Raj estate donated Rs 1,50,000 to build the hostel for female medical students. The other hostel was named after Bidumukhi Bose, one of the first female medical students," said Sujoy Majumdar, another alumnus who conducted the walk.

The group then visited Eden Hospital, which was inaugurated as a 100-bed facility

in April 1862 by Sir Ashley Eden, Lt Governor of Bengal. "A crucial feature was the isolation ward for cholera patients, the first example of an isolation ward in Asia. It was here that Sir Leonard Rogers carried out research on cholera. When the cholera ward shifted elsewhere, this ward became a septic ward for Eden Hospital — described as the first of its kind in the subcontinent. Over time, it grew into a 250-bed obstetrics and gynaecology unit," Ghose said.

The David Hare Block opened in 1930 as there was no separate surgical ward at Medical College. It was named Prince of Wales Hospital to commemorate his visit to India and renamed David Hare

Block in 1976 as a tribute to the only non-medical principal on his bicentennial birth anniversary: "I spent 10 years in this ward, and we had the privilege of a sunlit OT with Italian marble and the gallery from which we used to see the operations," Ghose recalled.

The walk ended on the iconic stairs of the "oldest building on the premises" — the MCH building — which came up as the college required greater space to accommodate a hospital to get recognition from Royal College of Surgeons of England and University of London. "Lord Dalhousie laid the foundation stone in 1848, and it was inaugurated in 1852 to accommodate 350 patients," Ghose added.
